The November council minutes were approved at the December meeting.

The financial report stated that we continue to keep our revenue ahead of our expenses. Motion was passed to accept the October financial.

Pastor reported that the letter was sent to 23 families relative to membership. One person has started coming once again. Evangelism has started talking about connectors. Youth Group and Confirmation continues to go well. The HOG group came and donating a check in Pastor Oechler's memory. On All Saint Sunday 67 names are to read, with six being St. Paul's members.

Spirit Alive lease extension update was given by Matt. He met with Margie (Spirit Alive) and they talked about how they are going through their process of looking for their new church home. They want to take a few months to finalize their plans.

Outreach reported the Noisy Offering continues to be successful. October's collection went to the purchase of socks. In November, food collection on Thanksgiving Eve will go to the Grace Welcome Center. The free will offering (over two weekends) will go for grocery gift cards, Treasure Boxes, and the Giving Tree. December Noisy Offering will go to Clairidge House. The team voted to adopt Clairidge House, and to promote the idea to the other ELCA Churches to adopt the remaining six nursing homes.

It Takes a Village will begin. Megan will have coloring books for the kids, but mostly it is for the adults to have some time to talk and share.

Complete council minutes are available in the church office in the binder on the counter. Additional copies are available for the taking in the Narthex, in a pocket file, on the nursery windows, near the council members' pictures.

PRAYER SHAWLS AND PRAYER SQUARES

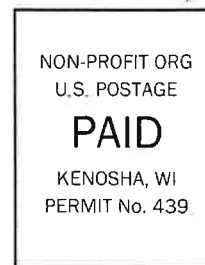

Hi to St. Paul's congregational members:

Thank you for the opportunity of developing the Tone Chimes groups last fall.

The sequence of events which have taken place are....

1. I started with a commitment from 2 students and 1 family
2. I then recruited families with children to create 5 members for the 1st 5 notes music students learn: C D E F G
3. Recruitment of members continued until I had 9 chimers to fill in the 8 note musical scale (repeating Tonic and Dominant notes)
Namely: A B C D E F G A in any order.
4. Then the group was split in the NEW YEAR to create the New Music readers and the Music Reading groups.
5. I created folders so they learned to read the color coded music in order on the musical staves.
(Our 4 and 5 year old chimers are actually reading the letters in order, just like we read words on a page!!!)
6. I very carefully chose musical literature which progressed sequentially and comprehensively.
7. This meant that the Tone Chimes members read: Whole, Dotted Half, Half, Quarter and the 2 Eighth note values.
8. In addition, the members learned to read the Treble clef and then added the Bass clef to create 4 and 5 part music and harmony.
9. When the musical alphabet is played in a different order, #'s (sharps) and b's (flats) are needed to make the major and minor scale sounds.
10. The last concept the music readers have learned is to play the Tonic, Subdominant and Dominant chords which create MOST
of the music we enjoy listening to. Westminster Chimes piece actually takes these chords and then placed the Tonic note on top,
thus creating a chord inversion, which makes all our hymns so beautiful when we hear or sing them.
This is the 4 part structure to music
(soprano, alto, tenor, bass.)

DIAKONIA NEWS

Last March we began our study of Christian Worship. Our main text was *Central Things: Worship in Word and Sacrament* by Gordon Lathrop. (2005 Augsburg Fortress) We were also required to read the Nairobi Statement on Worship and Culture developed by the Lutheran World Federation Study Team on Worship and Culture in Nairobi, Kenya (January, 1996).

I find it quite difficult to summarize what we learned and discussed about Christian worship. Here are some highlights.

Christian worship is centered around the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the sacraments. Everything we do in worship should teach and reflect the actions of Jesus. We gather in hospitality as a community to share in God's gift of worship for us.

Liturgy is the entire process of how we gather, read, listen to, and preach the scriptures. Liturgy is the pattern of our prayers, our singing, and our participation in the sacraments. The back pages of the ELW explain much of how to do what we do in our worship services.

Faithful worship adapts to global and contemporary culture, while maintaining Christ as its center.

The best part of the class was creating our final project. We learned to plan an entire worship service, choose music, write specific prayers, and craft a sermon. After considering planning our own funeral services, we each decided upon something different. I chose Pentecost Sunday. We each had to present our worship services to the class and explain the why of our choices. Writing a sermon each week seems rather daunting and the project was hard work, but I loved it.

AMAZING grace

CELEBRATING 250 YEARS

1773-2023

The beloved Christian hymn “Amazing Grace” was penned by the English poet and Anglican clergyman John Newton to accompany a sermon he preached on New Year’s Day, 1773. Over the last 250 years, it has become an immensely popular hymn, particularly in the United States, where it is used for both religious and secular purposes. The text for the hymn is drawn from 1 Chronicles 17:16-17, in which King David responds to the prophet Nathan’s words that God intends to continue David’s royal line for eternity. The text reads:

Then King David went in and sat before the LORD and said, “Who am I, O LORD God, and what is my house, that you have brought me thus far? And even this was a small thing in your sight, O God; you have also spoken of your servant’s house into the distant future. You regard me as someone of high rank, O LORD God!

Newton wrote the words of “Amazing Grace” from his own personal experience. In 1748 while Newton served as a sea captain of a ship in the Atlantic slave trade, a violent storm off the coast of Ireland struck his vessel so severely that he called out to God for mercy. This moment marked Newton’s turn toward God, what he called “the hour I first believed.” Eventually leaving sailing behind, Newton then began studying Christian theology and was ordained in the Church of England in 1764. He served as a minister in Olney, England, where he began writing hymns.

“Amazing Grace” was published in *Olney Hymns* in 1779, but was rarely sung in England. It was in the United States where the song would become widely known during the early 1800s. Today “Amazing Grace” remains one of the most recognizable songs in the English-speaking world.

the lyrics

*Amazing grace! How sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me!
I once was lost, but now am found; was blind, but now I see.*

*’Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved;
How precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed!*

*Through many dangers, toils, and snares, I have already come;
’Tis grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.*

*The Lord has promised good to me, his Word my hope secures;
He will my shield and portion be as long as life endures.*

*Yes, when this flesh and heart shall fail, and mortal life shall cease,
I shall possess, within the veil, a life of joy and peace.*

*The earth shall soon dissolve like snow, the sun forbear to shine;
But God, who called me here below, will be forever mine.*

*When we’ve been there ten thousand years, bright shining as the sun,
We’ve no less days to sing God’s praise than when we’d first begun.*

did you know?

“Amazing Grace” is one of the most recorded hymns of all time. The Library of Congress has more than 3,000 recordings in its library. Popular versions have been sung by Judy Collins, Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Aretha Franklin, Rod Stewart and Willie Nelson. Newton biographer Jonathan Aitken estimates that “Amazing Grace” is performed about 10 million times annually.

In 1982, Newton was recognized for his hymns by the Gospel Music Association when he was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame.
